Engineering Girls Camp

On Saturday February 17, 2001, SWE Philadelphia Section and Widener University hosted the second Engineering Girls Camp on the Widener campus. This year's camp was made possible through a grant from the American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME) and a generous donation from Maryann Skehan. There were 160 girls from 86 area high schools who applied for the camp. Once again we had more than we were able to accept. In all, 91 girls - some from as far away as Baltimore - attended the all-day event that included hands-on lab activities with Programmable Robots, Roller Coaster Design, Tower Building, Lego Cars, Aerodynamics with Paper Airplanes, Pasta Water Distribution Systems, Reaction Kinetics, and Chemical Process Simulations. The girls were able to have fun working on these projects while interacting with women engineers and Widener engineering students.

A new feature this year was a program for the parents - on what to expect and what to do to prepare their daughters for engineering school. Over 60 parents stayed for the morning-long program, which was as big a success as the Girls' Camp itself! A huge thank you to Philadelphia Section members Lisa Colosimo, Maggie Schwartz, Susan Sciarratta, Carole Stowell, and Maryann Skehan (also a Widener alum and a camp sponsor!), DelMar Peninsula Section member Maureen Foley, and Widener alumni Anastasia Foulke, Amy Koser, Antoinette MacIntyre, and Renee Nussbaumer for spending the day working with the girls. Judging by the comments made to Vicki Brown, who coordinated the camp for Widener and SWE, the girls really enjoyed themselves and learned a lot about what it's like to have a career in engineering.

Future City Competition 2001

The Philadelphia Region Future City Competition 2001 was held on Saturday, January 28, 2001 at the Great Hall on the campus of Drexel University. The Nehaunsey Middle School in Gibbstown, NJ won the Philadelphia Section award for the entry that best addresses Quality of Life issues in the design. The **TOUCH THE FUTURE** (TTF) event was designed to give middle school girls the opportunity to explore potential careers in the math and science areas. Research shows that at the middle school ages, girls begin to shy away from these careers.

Each workshop will be given 3-5 times for 30 minutes each (half of the time spent on questions), with the first workshop starting at 10:15 AM. There will also be tables in an Exploration and Discovery Room.

As you can see, the workshops give the girls the opportunity to "get their hands" involved. They don't want a lecture.

SWE Headquarters is Relocating to Chicago, Illinois and Washington, DC.

Press Release from Gina Ryan, SWE Executive Director

On Saturday, February 3, 2001, the Board of Directors of the Society of Women Engineers made a far-reaching leadership decision that will provide the professional support needed for SWE to enhance membership services and program growth. The Board unanimously voted to enter into an agreement with Bostrom Corporation, an association management company with offices in Washington DC, and Chicago Illinois, to provide all headquarters operations functions. This (agreement) entails moving SWE headquarters from New York to Chicago and to a satellite office in Washington.

The Board of Directors, Strategic Planning Committee, and Organizational Advisory Task Force have worked in tandem for many months on future directions for SWE and its big audacious goal ***of being the recognized authority on and advocate for women in engineering and technology.*** Coupled with these activities have been our efforts to carefully determine what kind of headquarters support is required to implement our ongoing operations, programs, and strategic goals.

For the better part of a year, we have sought and evaluated proposals for procuring, leasing, or outsourcing various functions such as association management web-based membership hardware and software, membership database maintenance and services, or comprehensive headquarters facilities and services.

Our SWE odyssey takes us many places – to annual conferences and national committee meetings, to regional conferences from coast to coast, to editorial board meetings that are usually in Chicago, and to section meetings with milestone events. A central location is advantageous for keeping in touch with our leaders and members. Beyond SWE, our odyssey often takes us to Washington DC for collaborative efforts with allied engineering societies, federal agencies, and other non-governmental organizations with mutual interests and goals. Thus, the search for a model that would provide us with

the necessary facilities, equipment, and staff capabilities led us to the concept of corporate headquarters in Chicago, with a satellite public affairs office in Washington DC.

Key SWE professionals will remain under this proposal. The SWE executive director, deputy director of organizational advancement, and the SWE magazine editor will remain employees of SWE. The SWE magazine advertising sales representative and annual conference manager will be retained under existing contracts.

The Board is very appreciative of the service rendered over the years by the New York staff and wishes them well as they seek new career opportunities.

The physical move and Phase I transition will occur during February and March 2001. This will be a period of challenging changes. During Phase II between April and July, we plan to put systems in place and smooth out functions and services. By the time Phase III concludes at the end of one full year's cycle, we expect to exceed expectations.
