# **FY002 Scholarship Program**

In order to reach out to more of the women engineering students who attend schools within the Philadelphia Section boundaries, we have changed the eligibility requirements for our Section Scholarship Awards to give more local students the opportunity to apply for the awards. Previously, eligibility was limited to full-time female undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in an engineering program at schools that have a SWE Student Section and are located within the Philadelphia Section boundaries, specifically, Drexel University, Swarthmore College, Temple University, University of Pennsylvania, Villanova University, and Widener University.

Eligibility is now expanded to include full-time female undergraduate and graduate students in an engineering or engineering technology discipline or in computer science. The list of eligible schools now also includes Penn State Abington, Penn State Delaware County, Penn State Harrisburg, Penn State York, Philadelphia University, and Thaddeus Stevens College of Technology. Previous winners of SWE Philadelphia Section scholarships and/or other SWE national or section scholarships are also eligible as long as the student is currently enrolled in an engineering,

engineering technology, or computer science program at one of the schools listed above.

Notices have been sent out to the local SWE Student Sections and to selected faculty at the schools that do not have student sections. # Third Annual Engineering Camp For High School Girls

The third annual SWE - Widener University one-day engineering camp for girls in grades 9-12 was held on Saturday, February 23, 2002, at the Widener campus in Chester, PA. The participants included 91 girls, approximately 65 parents, 21 women engineers, and about 14 women engineering students. The girls had hands-on laboratory experience while interacting with members from the SWE Philadelphia and DelMar Peninsula Sections, other Widener engineering alumnae, members of the SWE Widener University Student Section. Each girl could select four of the eight available labs: Aerodynamics and Flight, Reaction Kinetics, Electric Circuits, Tower Building, Programming Robots, Roller Coasters, Motorized Lego Vehicles, and Water Treatment Systems. In the camp evaluations filled out by the girls, 86% said that the camp would help them decide whether or not to major in engineering, while 84 % said that they were more excited and enthusiastic about an engineering career.

This year also featured an expanded Parents' Program that focused on career opportunities for women in engineering, as well as financial, academic, emotional, and social aspects of preparing a daughter for engineering school. The Parents' Program ran concurrently with the labs for the girls. The parents also took advantage of the lunch session and inbetween times to speak with the SWE members who were there.

Thanks to Philadelphia SWE members Vicki Brown, Megan Kline, Maggie Schwartz, Susan Sciarratta, Mary Ann Skehan, Lisa Colosimo, Christine El-Beyrouty, and Barb Faust, and to all the other women engineers and students who helped to make this another successful event.

#### BREAST CANCER FACTS

- Breast cancer is the leading cause of death among women ages 40-59, and it is the leading cause of cancer death among women ages 20-39.
- For women between the ages of 50-69, there is strong evidence that mammography reduces breast cancer deaths by approximately 30%.
- In 2001, it is estimated that 192,200 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer, and 40,200 women will die of breast cancer.
- In 2001, it is estimated that 1,500 men will develop breast cancer, and 400 will die.
- One woman is diagnosed with breast cancer every 3 minutes, and one woman will die of breast cancer every 13 minutes.
- Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women of all ages. The most proven and significant risk factors
  are being female and getting older.
- African Americans have the highest death rate from breast cancer of any racial/ethnic group in the United States.
- Breast cancer is the leading cancer site among American women and is second only to lung cancer in cancer deaths.
- $\cdot$  The majority of women with breast cancer have no known significant family history or other known risk factors.
- Only 5-10% of breast cancers are due to heredity. If her cancer is detected while still confined to the breast, a
  woman has a five-year survival rate of over 95%.
- A woman's chance of developing breast cancer increases with age. In the United States, a woman has about a 13% lifetime risk of developing breast cancer.
- In the Vietnam War, 59,000 American soldiers died. During that same 10-year period, 330,000 American women died of breast cancer.

## Council of Section Representatives Meeting Recap

Maggie Schwartz, one of our two Philadelphia Section Representatives, attended the FY 02 Council of Section Representatives (CSR) meeting held in Chicago on March 9th, 2002. #### Food for thought from the monster.com site

Women in Nontraditional Fields by Therese Droste, Monster Admin/Support Career Advisor

#### Summary

Women are making their way into male-dominated fields. More are moving into high tech, science and management. Pay scales for men and women are still uneven.

It's 2002, and more and more many traditionally male-dominated fields are now drawing more women. The worlds of high tech, science and management are just a few areas where, more and more, women are making their mark.

#### Women in High Tech

Katherine Tobin, senior director of research at Catalyst, a Manhattan-based research and advisory group for women recently performed a study called "Leadership Careers in High Tech: Wired for Success." The study included 19 women and 11 men who are "emerging leaders" in 10 technology companies that sell, develop, design and service computer hardware, software and telecommunications.

In Tobin's study, most women agreed mentors were vital to their careers. "Women had stories of multiple mentors and said they would not be where they were today if they hadn't had their mentors," says Tobin.

Although women make up 51 percent of the population and earn 56 percent of all bachelor-level degrees awarded, women earned only 27 percent of the bachelor-level computer and information science degrees awarded by US academic institutions from 1997 to '98. And the share of all computer science degrees awarded to women in the US has fallen from a peak of 37 percent from 1984 to '85 to 27 percent from 1997 to '98, according to the US Department of Education.

#### Got a Head for Science?

If you have a head for science, don't shy away from pursuing your talents. Indeed, science is another burgeoning field for women. The Washington, DC-based American Association for the Advancement of Science's first ever study of its members reveals that not only do most scientists like their

jobs, they also feel their education has paid off in a highly rewarding, if not lucrative, career.

According to the study, the number of women joining life sciences will find a gender pay gap: Men earn almost one-third more than women do -- \$94,000 versus \$72,000. The salary gap is greatest among academic administrators, where the midpoint is \$120,000 for men and \$75,000 for women; in industry and government, the pay is \$160,000 for men and \$125,000 for women.

The gender gap isn't limited to the workplace, either. Most women scientists in the study felt their careers were constrained to some extent by their spouses. On the other hand, only 7 percent of the male scientists felt their spouse's career needs had seriously affected their own. As such, more women than men reported holding part-time jobs.

#### Women in Management and on Boards

How are women in management faring compared to five years ago? A recent report of data from 10 industries reflects that female managers continue to lag behind men in both pay and advancement. "A New Look Through the Glass Ceiling: Where are the Women?" was released in January by Representatives John Dingell (D-Michigan) and Carolyn Maloney (D-New York). According to the report, women managers are more common in personnel, human relations, education and related fields. Only one of the industries studied – professional medical services -- had more women managers than men. Although women in management may lag behind men, there is some progress in the number of women on corporate boards -- a presence that directly impacts a company's direction as well as its attitude toward women. In the "2001 Census of Women Board Directors of the Fortune 1000," another report released by Catalyst, women hold 12.4 percent of all board seats in the Fortune 500, an increase from 11.2 percent in 1999, and almost 11 percent of all board seats in the Fortune 1000, up from 10 percent in 1999.
